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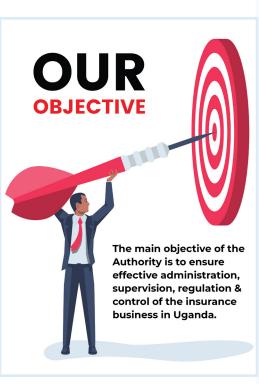
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Foreword

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Reputation matters: Insurers tipped

nsurance industry players have been urged to undertake reforms to enhance the industry's reputation and demonstrate a commitment to policyholder protection. Speaking at the 65th CEO's Breakfast meeting at Kampala Serena Hotel on September 11, 2025, the Chairperson Insurance Appeals Tribunal (IAT), Ms. Rita Namakiika Nangono said reforms should aim at addressing current issues and practices affecting the industry to enhance sector reputation and public trust.

challenge in the industry which stems from complex policy terms, lengthy claims processes and inadequate claims support.

"The issue of lack of trust has been a big challenge in the industry for long. We need to address it to build confidence among the current and prospecting policyholders.

"As players in the industry, we must focus on transparency, clear communication, and fair and faster claim handling to improve customer experience," she said.

Among the reforms she called for include identifying and simplifying ambiguous policy wordings, claims handling procedures, disclosure to policyholders, policyholder rights, and putting in place more effective d i s p u t e resolution mechanisms.

"We have seen vague policy documents with clauses that leave the policy illusory and almost unenforceable and this fuels disputes. You need to do policy audits to ensure that policies (contracts) are clear," she said.

She added: "We have also seen policy documents where the claim process is vague and the insurer has not taken any steps to guide the insured on how and when the claims ought to be made. This could amount to bad faith for which the insurer is likely to be held liable."

She further urged loss assessors and adjusters to prepare quality reports to enable underwriters (insurers) make better decisions regarding claims payment.

Uganda's insurance industry expected to grow faster in

2nd half of 2025

ganda's insurance industry is expected to continue on a positive growth trajectory in the second half of 2025 due to heightened growth in microinsurance and increased adoption of digital technology along the insurance value chain.

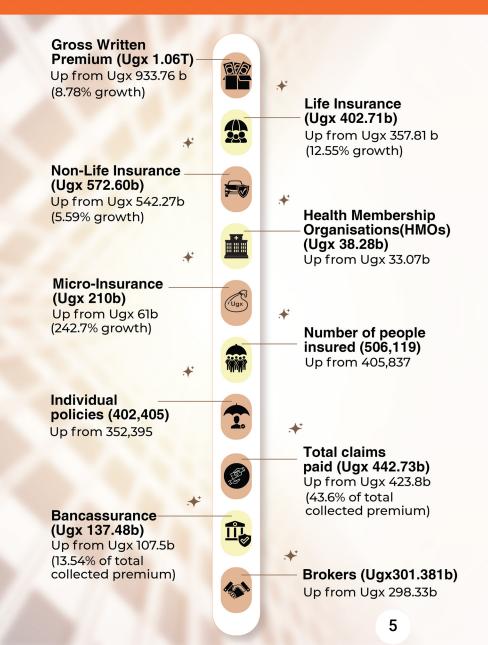
According to the Insurance Regulatory Authority of Uganda (IRA) Chief Executive Officer, Alhaj Dr. Kaddunabbi Ibrahim Lubega said microinsurance is currently the fastest growing segment of the industry and its growth momentum is expected to continue into the second half of the year.

He further noted that sustained performance of the life sector and increased adoption of digital technology along the insurance value chain demonstrates proactive efforts to overcome accessibility barriers, pointing to a brighter future ahead.

"Combined with a commitment to financial inclusion, innovative product offerings, and efficient claims management, these factors are driving growth and shaping a positive outlook for Uganda's insurance industry," he said.

He was speaking at a press conference to release industry performance statistics for the first half of 2025, at the Insurance Tower on September 4.

Q2 INDUSTRY PERFORMANCE COMPARED TO THE SAME PERIOD IN 2024



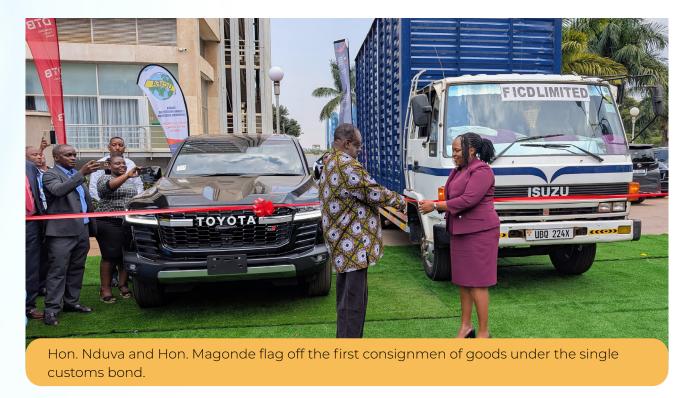


During the period under review, the industry received a total of 168 complaints from policyholders, of which 150 were successfully resolved, reflecting a resolution rate of 89 percent.

The total value at risk associated with the reported complaints was estimated at Ugx.18 billion. The figures underscore the scale of consumer grievances being addressed and the sector's commitment to timely resolution.

Seamless trade expected as EAC launches single customs bond



raders operating across the East African Community (EAC) Partner States are set to enjoy seamless cross border movement of goods following the launch of the single customs bond.

Unveiled at Sheraton Hotel, Kampala on August 4, 2025, the customs bond replaces multiple national customs bonds with one unified system to allow traders to secure their cargo journey under a single guarantee.

This is expected to simplify cargo movement across Partner States, reduce trade costs, and boost regional integration. Additionally, it will eliminate border delays, unlock working capital for traders, and lower the cost of goods.

Speaking at the launch, EAC Secretary General Hon. Veronica Nduva noted that the bond will free up traders' money that was tied up in deposits, allowing businesses to reinvest in expansion and create more jobs.

"Each year, over USD35 billion (about Ugx.124.5 trillion) worth of goods move through our regional corridors, yet much of this trade has been constrained by high financial guarantees and complex border procedures," she said.

She added: "The EAC Customs bond will ease compliance, reduce operational costs will also improve trade transparency through real-time tracking, reducing fraud and cargo diversion."

The EAC Deputy Secretary General for Customs, Trade and Monetary Affairs, Ms. Annette Ssemuwemba Mutaawe, said the bond was developed through a phased consultative process and that it reflects the collective resolve of governments and private sector partners to ease trade and unlock economic opportunities across East Africa.

In a speech read for her by the Minister of State for East African Community Affairs, Hon. James Magonde Ikuya, the Minister for EAC Affairs, Hon. Rebecca Kadaga hailed the initiative as a game changer for regional trade.

Uganda (IRA) Chief Executive Officer, Alhaj Dr. Kaddunabbi Ibrahim Lubega underscored the insurance sector's role in the success of the initiative. He noted that during this pilot phase, regional insurance regulators will among others, conduct actuarial studies to refine the bond's structure to pave way for final approval and full rollout.

He further noted that the bond will enhance trade efficiency while reinforcing the insurance sector's involvement in regional integration.

Additionally, he said that the East African Insurance Supervisors Association (EAISA) will conduct a comprehensive stakeholder sensitization program to equip stakeholders He urged all stakeholders to actively participate

and provide feedback during this pilot phase to help in building a framework that not only supports trade but also strengthens the insurance sector's role in regional integration.

The system integrates seamlessly with the Regional Electronic Cargo Tracking System (RECTS), enabling real-time monitoring of cargo and automated compliance checks. The bond is also anchored in the EAC's Single Customs Territory framework,

aligning with the regional goal of seamless trade.

The EAC Customs Bond is expected to unlock nearly USD2 billion (Ugx.7.1 trillion) in previously tied-up capital, facilitating investment, innovation, and job creation across the region.

"It will enhance our credibility and public confidence that we are committed to transparency, accountability and continuous performance improvement in our regulatory processes and service delivery," he said.

Headded: "We committo providing timely and quality regulatory services at all times through institutional strengthening, market development, compliance, regulation, supervision and stakeholder excellence."

The IRA Director Strategy and Market Development, Mr. Protazio Sande said the decision to get ISO certified was informed by the desire to serve customers better.

"Expect high-quality services; and if you get a service today, expect that it will be better tomorrow because continuous improvement is now part of our DNA," he said.

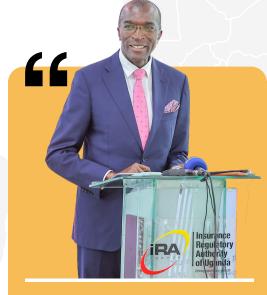
Ms. Susan Lubega, a Managing Partner at Quality Assurance and Management Consultants, the firm that assessed IRA processes and procedures and prepared it for certification urged IRA stakeholders to provide constructive criticism to help better the insurance sector.

"With is certificate, stakeholders should expect timely service delivery. If they say three working days and you don't get it in that time, raise a red flag. That is how IRA will improve, and in turn the insurance sector will become better," she said.

Time for regional solutions



he State Minister of Finance, Planning and Economic Development (General Duties), Hon. Henry Musasizi, has challenged members of the Organisation of Eastern and Southern Africa Insurers (OESAI) to move beyond diagnosing risks and focus on delivering practical solutions that meet the evolving client needs.

Speaking at the official opening of the 47th OESAI Conference and Annual General Meeting on August 25, 2025 at Munyonyo Speke Resort Convention Centre, Hon. Musasizi underscored the urgency for insurers to expand inclusion and rebuild public trust.

"The barriers are well known: limited awareness, affordability constraints, and persistent trust deficits. Today, I challenge us to move beyond diagnosis to providing solutions by embedding microinsurance and community-based schemes into national social protection frameworks, investing in building trust and governance, and harnessing innovation through mobile and digital channels," Hon. Musasizi said.

He further cautioned insurers against overemphasizing profitability as the sole measure of success, urging them to consider their broader impact as well.

"Successfortheinsuranceindustryshould not be measured only in profitability, but in how many lives are protected; how many businesses recover from shocks; and how many communities are made more resilient. Insurance should not only be viewed as a business, but as a public good and a pillar of shared prosperity," he noted.

OESAI is a membership organization with 135 member companies, spanning countries both within and beyond the region.

Speaking at the same event, the Insurance Regulatory Authority of Uganda (IRA) Chief Executive Officer, Alhaj Kaddunabbi Ibrahim Lubega, urged insurers to prioritize customer experience as a driver of growth, profitability, and penetration.

"The next gains will come from three things: agility, simplicity, and fairness - how fast you issue and pay claims; how easy products are to understand; and how well customers are treated across the insurance life cycle," he said.

Highlighting IRA's progress, Alhaj Dr. Kaddunabbi remarked that the Authority has strengthened its systems to meet global best practices in customer service.

"We are now ISO 9001:2015 certified. This certification reinforces customer focus and continuous improvement in our service delivery. It ensures transparent service standards, clearly defined processes, and improved data management, which hold us accountable to our stakeholders," he noted.

Conventional or sharia-based insurance; the ball is in your hands

gandans will soon be able to choose between conventional and sharia-based insurance to insure against the various risks they face.

This follows a pronouncement by the Insurance Regulatory Authority of Uganda (IRA) that it is in advance stages of licensing the first Takaful insurance service provider.

Speaking at a half-day Takaful insurance workshop on June 23, 2025, at Hotel Africana to sensitize industry players about Takaful, the IRA Director Supervision, Mr. Benerd Obel said this will present policyholders and prospects with options to choose from.

He noted that the arrangement of policyholders sharing into profits made by a Takaful insurer at the end of a given period is a plus for this kind of product and is expected to widen and deepen the insurance market, especially among the uninsured public that has been skeptical about conventional insurance.

Takaful is a unique and ethical financial model rooted in the principles of mutual cooperation, shared responsibility, and social solidarity. It is grounded in Shariah law, emphasizing fairness, transparency, and ethical investment, which sets it apart from conventional insurance model.

It operates as a cooperative system where participants contribute to a pool

of funds, which are then used to support individuals within the group in times of need, embodying the principle of collective care.

Dr. Twaha Ahmed Kasule, a senior lecturer at the Islamic University in Uganda (IUIU) who was the keynote speaker said Uganda is ready for the adoption of Takaful insurance model. "What we neededwerethelegalreformsandthese have been finalized by IRA and are will be signed soon.

"More than 200 students have been training people in Islamic finance and banking at the IUIU. This means the knowledge of Islamic insurance is already in the market," Kasule said.

He noted that companies intending to offer Takaful insurance should have sharia committees to enable them comply with sharia principles while undertaking investments and handling resources.

"This will widen the scope of the insurance business. There is always the issue of the group that is always left out on insurance but once you bring on board Takaful, you help insurance inclusion and improve insurance penetration," he said.

Journalists urged to uphold professionalism

hile insurance is an important tool individuals bounce back seamlessly after suffering setbacks that would take them long to recover, it continues to receive limited coverage from main stream media compared to other sectors of the economy.

This was revealed at a recent Insurance Media Workshop organized by the Uganda Insurers Association (UIA) at Fairway Hotel, Kampala, to devise ways of improving coverage of insurance-related stories, given the media's power to shape narratives and influence decisions.

The meeting agreed that while accuracy is essential, insurers should strive to explain key details in plain language that average person noting that simple an

average person can understand, noting that simple and clear messaging is a foundation on which trust is built, relationships are nurtured, and perceptions are changed.

Organised under the theme, "Bridging the

Organised under the theme, "Bridging the Gap: Rethinking Insurance Reporting in Uganda" the engagement sought to demystify complex insurance terminologies and equip media professionals with the right context and contacts to cover insurance accurately.

The Bukedde Newspaper Editor, Mr. Michael Ssebbowa urged insurers to translate insurance in local languages to localize the messaging, noting that it currently feels foreign.

"We need to make insurance simple enough for the ordinary Ugandan; that is when we will also give it prominence in our media outlets.

Our audiences want something they can relate to," Ssebowa said.

The NBS TV Head of Current Affairs, Mr. Dalton Kaweesa and Radio One's Business Editor, Mr. Wycliff Ssebunya urged insurers to stop focusing merely on releasing statistics, instead tell a story from a consumer perspective for the

public to how insurance impacts their lives.



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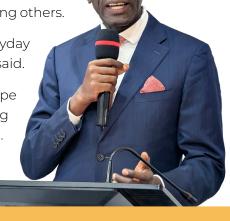

Medical service providers meet IRA to align

prequalification requirements



he Insurance Regulatory Authority of Uganda (IRA) on Wednesday August 20, 2025 held a consultative meeting with the medical service providers to deliberate on how to ensure that Ugandans have access to reliable, safe, and quality health services under health insurance arrangement.

The meeting was attended by private medical service providers from Uganda Medical and Dental Practitioners Council (UMDPC), Uganda Healthcare Federation, and the Uganda Private Medical Practitioners' Association. The consultation followed discontentment by some medical service providers over a new guideline, requiring them to be prequalified by the IRA before offering insurance related services.

The requirement sought to ensure that only qualified and reliable healthcare facilities are included on the panel or list of health insurance providers. The objective is to enhance the quality of healthcare services provided to insurance policyholders.

Speaking at the meeting held at the Insurance

Tower, the IRA Chief Executive Officer, Alhaj Dr. Kaddunabbi Ibrahim Lubega, said the move to have medical service providers prequalified intended to establish a transparent, fair, and professional system for accrediting medical facilities that partner with insurers. This would enable the public (insurance policyholders), who are clients in the medical facilities receive high quality healthcare services.

"We are not here to compete with, or take over, the mandate of the UMDPC whose statutory role is licensing, professional regulation, and disciplining medical practitioners. This mandate remains central and unquestioned. IRA is proposing complementary service provision to ensure that insurance-supported health facilities deliver value, fairness, and quality to policyholders" Alhaj Kaddunabbi said.

He added: "The initiative is about strengthening collaboration, not creating parallel systems. We believe that by working together, we can address challenges such as fraud, delayed claims settlement, unethical billing, and address the gaps in patient care."

The UMDPC Chairperson, Prof. Joel Okullo, said there is need to clearly define roles of each institution but also outline clear intersections when it comes to service delivery. He noted that the issue at hand is not about duplication of services but looking for ways of working together to serve the public.

Alhaj Kaddunabbi noted that while this growth signals trust in private health insurance, it also presents challenges such as rising claims - some driven by fraud and

abuse, inconsistencies in billing practices, and instances where patients feel cheated.

By prequalifying facilities, the insurance sector regulator hopes to build a trusted network of providers that insurers and the public can rely on.

This achievement, even before the mandatory enforcement of the local marine and good-in-transitinsurance, has made Uganda become a regional benchmark as countries seek to perfect the enforcement of this product in their jurisdictions.

Mr. Sande further noted that the technical team is in advance stages to fix all gaps so as to pave way for mandatory enforcement in the coming months.

Buying marine insurance locally enables importers to secure insurance cover for their goods in local currency at subsidized premium rates. This will also facilitate prompt and efficient claims processing in case of damage or loss of goods in transit.

It also enables importers to have direct access to their insurers, eliminating the complexities of dealing with foreign entities ensuring that businesses recover swiftly and continue their operations with minimal disruption in the unfortunate event of cargo loss or damage.

Additionally, retaining insurance premiums within our borders enhances the liquidity of the local financial markets and contributes to national revenue.

Dr. Zalwango expressed gratitude to IRA for the kind gesture, saying the donation will boost its waste sorting efforts.

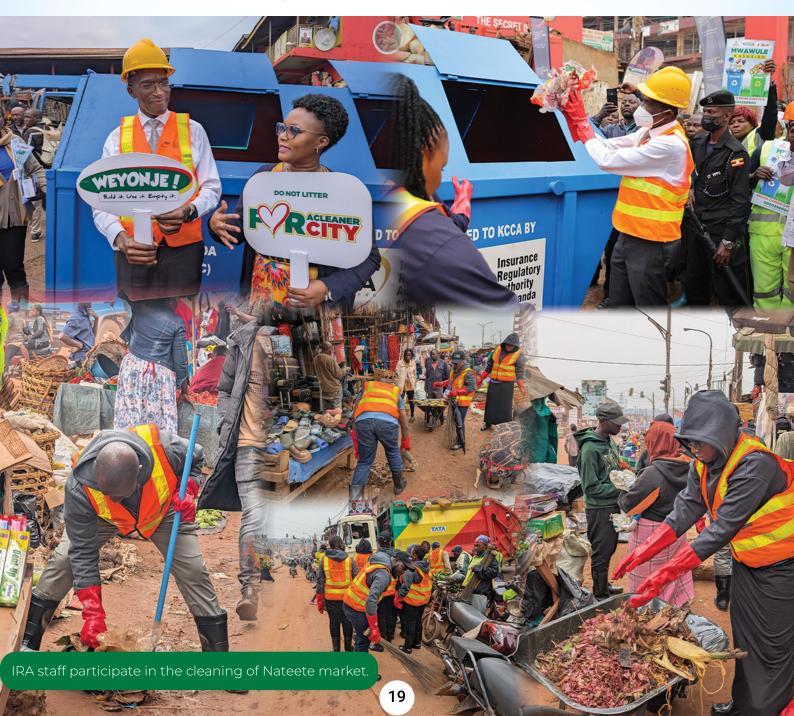
